Quotes

- A good referee need nerves of steel and a cool head ... a strong personality and be able to exercise self-control, especially when provoked. You also need to communicate well with the players. If you go on the field with an arrogant, dictatorial attitude, it is very difficult to be accepted and win respect. A glance from the referee should be enough to make a player understand that he is breaking the rules. Body language is very important, especially when you cannot communicate in a foreign language. Sometimes everything can depend on the way you look at a player. Massimo Busacca, Fifa & World Cup referee (2006)
- You need to be a good communicator, not just of decisions made but equally important have the ability to get your message across to players, managers and spectators. Referees are required to remain calm, controlled and develop high concentration levels to be successful. lan Blanchard, ex-head of FA's National Referee Development (2008)
- The best referee is the one who is seen and heard when the game or situation requires him to be seen or heard. Referees should attempt to manage the game in the background. When the players are not cooperating, the referee must then make his presence known and his message must be seen and/or heard. USA Referee Training Program (2009)

Communication

As referees what is communicated to players?

- Opinions
- Orders/instructions
- Feelings
- Facts/Laws/Rules
- "It is not so much important as to what I say, but rather more what the player understands"

Effective Communication



- Smile (or at least appear positive)
- Establish a rapport with captains at first and players whenever the opportunity arises
- Leave the Ego at home the game is for both you and the players
- Admit your mistakes players will realise that you are human – explain from your point of view

Effective Communication

- Explain your decision when possible
- Be approachable and receptive without disturbing the flow of the game
- Communicate with players on their level
- Use your body language to show composure

Good communication

- Whistle
- Gaze
- Signals
- Explanation
- Ontrol/

- Loud & Sharp blast
- Quick to diffuse potential issues
- Good eye contact
- Full view of incident area
- Prompt signals that are clear to all
- Hold signals to show authority
- Verbal communication of offence
- Concise and accurate
- Calm
- Confident
- Assured
- Take your time to make informed decisions


